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## *Editorial*

You will notice in this issue, as in the December 1980 issue of the journal, that maiden surnames are underlined and the surnames of males and married women are in block capitals. This should aid readers as they search for names in the body of the text. Also dates are given in full (in the form 21 January 1865 or 7 July 1810) in the text but are abbreviated (21 JAN 1865 and 07 JUL 1810) in genealogical tables. These forms of names and dates will be followed in future issues.

The time may have come when we need to reconsider some aspects of our journal. The present editor has seen all issues of *Tasmanian Ancestry* through from manuscript to print, designing the cover and layout, typing more than sixty percent of the text, handsetting the headings and helping with collating and stapling. The first two issues were printed by the cheap but unreliable disposable paper plate process and the June issue was a disaster. The December number was printed using permanent metal plates and achieved a much superior production standard

There is, however, a monetary price to pay for high standards. Good paper is not cheap and is also heavier; thus postage is more expensive. The permanent metal plate printing process does allow for cheaper second runs, but the first print run is much more expensive. Not only are metal plates ten times as dear as paper, but costly silver bromide negatives are an intermediate stage. Can the Society continue to afford over \$400 for each issue of the journal when we have so many other expenses in the year ahead? Should we change format to A4 and use duplicating paper on a Gestetner or Roneo machine? Your opinions are sought.

A few days recently spent touring the East and North-East Coasts of Tasmania has greatly enlarged my understanding of the early settlement of those areas. A map does not adequately show dense forest, great sand dunes or sudden steep valleys, but these are obvious to any visitor especially if detours are made off the main roads. The names of certain places and properties mean more to me now that I have learned about the early families who had the courage to settle in such remote areas.

The pursuit of genealogy offers us a closer look at history and often leads us to learn a great deal about geography too. Many of our members have made pilgrimages to areas where relatives once lived and have often been excited to discover distant family members still living nearby. It is a rewarding experience. Miss Karlena Nagle of Launceston happened to visit the Henry Street Cemetery in Sorell with a group who were copying tombstones there and was thrilled to discover memorials of many of her relatives as well as two persons helping with the copying who were distantly connected. It was a pleasure to see her reaction.

The two front rooms of the Clarence Council's building at 3 Percy Street, Bellerive have been leased for our Library. A few alterations are to be made and then we can move in. The building has a car park on one side and the Real Estate Office is on the other. It is only ten minutes drive from the city and just around the corner from the bus stop near the Bellerive Post Office. To celebrate its opening, a 'Library Shower' will be held on Saturday 2 May, from 2 to 4 p.m. The receipt of a catalogue of library equipment gave us a lot of grand ideas, but a tight budget means that we must make do for quite a while. An increase of membership would help us to provide more resources, so do share your enjoyment of your family research and encourage your friends to come along to Society meetings.

The Society's Council has agreed to lease part of the *International Genealogical Index* from the Genealogical Society of Utah and arrangements are underway to obtain the microfiche containing the data on persons from the British Isles and Northern Europe. A basic microfiche reading machine will need to be purchased.

Several members, who recently joined the Society, would like to obtain copies of the first two issues of our journal which are now out of print. If sufficient numbers are required, arrangements could be made to reprint these issues, so please let the Secretary know (in writing) if you want to complete your set.

Annual subscriptions are due on 1 April, and a form is enclosed for your convenience. Prompt payment would help us with necessary planning

The State Librarian has suggested that small groups from the Society could attend the Library to learn about methods of record conserv-

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ation. Please let us know if you wish to be included in such a group.

The beautifully bound volume of the *Census of New South Wales, 1888* has been received for our library and could be valuable to those who have ancestors known to be there in early years. I only wish we had such a record from this state.

# A Droll Story

"O how droll" remarked a friend when I mentioned that I thought it would be interesting to research my family history. Little did I realise what a tangle I had to sort out, and how much I would have to lean on my patience and sense of humour.

My father's name is Roy Leigh Best, grandfather was Edward, great grandfather John, his wife Amelia (nee Smith); John's parents were Charles and Hanah Best, at least that was a start, but when did they arrive here? where were they born? and most importantly what part of England and Scotland did they come from? - where could I discover this information?

Firstly I tried quizzing relations but that really confused me more because I received different answers. "Bests came from England" said one, quite shocked I didn't know. Later I received more clues - Devon, Somerset, Sussex, Essex or Kent, according to whom I asked.

At last I thought I had sufficient information to go to the Archives. Charles and Hanah Best, with four sons, namely George, Charles, John and James and daughters Elizabeth, Caroline, and Sarah, came from Devon or Sussex with sheep for the Cressy Company, about 1829.

With the help of the patient staff of the Archives, I learnt that the family probably arrived per the *Orelia* on the 8th May 1829 with Best and party - there were a few family names mentioned but not all.

At that stage I was about to leave for the U.K., and hoped to learn more there. A few days before my departure a relation contacted me and informed me that the family came from a village near Brighton and Lewes, and thought the name was Bede or similar. I was to learn in London that I had insufficient facts; actual dates of birth and place were needed.

However, I did visit Brighton and whilst there I purchased two booklets of maps which are proving most useful in my studies since returning home. The titles of the books are *In and around Sussex* published by Borough of Brighton Resort and Conference Service Department and Estate Publications Sussex - the latter contains 50 town centre street maps. I also purchased a map of Sussex dated 1790.

After returning home, I learnt that there were moves afoot to form a Society of Genealogical Studies in Hobart so decided to join. I was pleased to learn during these meetings that I was not the first person to blunder along making mistakes, and the correct method of searching and filing information has proved most valuable.

On receipt of Charles Best's death certificate I learnt he was known as Charles Best, yeoman. Now did this mean yeoman farmer or was he a military man. Quite recently I was given the information that he was indeed a soldier, rank unknown, and was at one time a prisoner in France, and that his wife was French - something more to prove. Hanah died in 1830 and was buried in the Cypress St. burial ground. I have been told the records have been lost.

I have been able to study the Computer File Index and discovered most of the children were baptised at Boeding, Sussex.

After learning at one of our meetings that copies of wills made out in Tasmania were kept in the Supreme Court, I went along, rather doubtfully. To my delight I discovered one made out by Sarah Upton, daughter of Charles Best and in it she had identified her brothers and sisters and their families and in some cases their grandchildren. Also she mentioned who was to receive her photographs.

Obituaries have been helpful, and from these I have learnt the professions, hobbies and interests, and which family members left for the goldfields of Victoria and South Australia.

One member of the first family, Caroline, who married Byron Young, went to the Californian goldfields in 1857. No one received news of their arrival - did they reach their destination? I have not been able to discover the name of the ship they sailed on. However, as I have learnt so much, maybe I will eventually solve that mystery.

Searching family history takes many roads, meeting relations, exchanging information, sorting out photos etc. All make for a most interesting activity.

# Denholm Connections

One of the surprises in writing *The Dwellers at the Farm in the Valley* — the story of the Denholm family — was to find people whom I had known for years were connected by marriage with sections of my family.

Douglas Clark's article (Land Alienation and Early Settlers in the Huon Valley, in *Tasmanian Ancestry* Vol. 1 No. 2, 1980) is an example of how Tasmanian families are connected.

Mr. Clark refers to Mrs. Marion Monteith Moyes CAMPBELL who married John WALLIS in 1879. In my book she is mentioned as the eldest daughter of William MOYES and Janet (known as Jessie) Taylor, but I knew nothing of her further history. She was christened after her grandmother, Marion Monteith, who was married to John TAYLOR in Scotland, and after his death, married to John WALDIE who, with his new wife and her children, migrated to Tasmania in 1835. Marion Monteith WALDIE was the sister of the famous soldier, explorer, historian and geographer, General MONTEITH, whose exploits in India, Persia and Russia are set out in two columns of the *Dictionary of National Biography*. She died, aged 92, in 1877 in Bridgewater, at the home of her daughter, then Mrs. MOYES. Another of her daughters, Clemintina Taylor, married my great grandfather, Alexander DENHOLM the Younger, and the name Monteith was given to many of their descendants.

William MOYES migrated from Fife in 1822 and settled in Bothwell. He was a carpenter, and was the partner of my great great grandfather, Alexander DENHOLM and operated as carpenters and wheelwrights. They also are mentioned in the *Clyde Company Papers* and in Bethell's *The Valley of the Derwent* as owning the 'Falls of Clyde', a twelve room, two storey brick inn at Bothwell, which they advertised for sale in 1837. This may have been the building now known as the 'Coffee House', owned by Dr. BRENNAN. William MOYES later kept the 'Castle Inn', the best of the four inns at Bothwell.

John WALDIE had a son by his first marriage, who joined his father in Tasmania, and settled at Oyster Cove. His direct descendant, Mr. J.B. WALDIE, has his ancestor's diary, kept over many years and was responsible for the establishment of the Channel Historical and Folk Museum.

# *Of Grandparents & Grandchildren*

These reminiscences concern fortuitous happenings during a lifetime of family research which began for me when I was twelve, unaware that I was embarking on a genealogical project which still continues more than sixty years later.

Each incident is linked to loving communication between grandparent and grandchild and an inherent feeling of family continuity. So, likewise, this communication is one from me to my grandchildren.

As a direct result of the Mount Lyell Disaster of 1912, my father had died in 1914 and my mother, Eva, had to make plans for the future of her family. Of these, my eldest sister married in 1917; the next sister, Florence, was teaching school at Queenstown; my elder brother, John, was employed in the office of the Mount Lyell Mining Company. So her plans primarily concerned myself, Georgina, my younger sister, Gertrude and my brother, Walter, born three weeks after the death of our father, John Olive LEES.

Accordingly, we left Queenstown. My mother invested her capital in a timber business run by her brother-in-law at Forester, near Scottsdale, and took the two youngest children with her, leaving me in the care of her mother, Emily Dixon DUTTON, so that I could attend Charles Street School in Launceston for the last few months of the year and qualify for entrance to the Launceston High School in January of 1918.

It was while I was staying with my grandmother in Launceston that three of these fortuitous circumstances occurred. She was very family conscious, not only of her own progenitors, but of those of her late husband, and used to tell me about these; and to the child I was then, they sounded very romantic, especially the fact that she had been born in the West Indies, those 'far-flung tropical islands.'

Her grandfather, Myles Coupland DIXON, had been a Wesleyan Church minister and had served part of his ministry in the British West Indies where his two eldest sons, at least, had been born before he returned to serve in England for thirty-four years. His eldest son, John Coupland DIXON, was my great-grandfather.

As an adult John trained at King's College, London for the Church of England ministry, and having married Eliza Lovekin, was in his turn sent to the West Indies, his birthplace, as a Church of England minister; and there the first three of his children were born before he was transferred to Nova Scotia. The third child was my grandmother, Emily Dixon.

Perhaps to a child's mind interest in tropical islands and tales of treasure are two variations on the one theme, so when my grandmother told me that some time previously she had had to send to the West Indies to get copies of her and a brother's baptismal certificates because of an expected inheritance from her LOVEKIN relatives in England, this was

doubly interesting.

Why I made a copy of the two extracts from the baptism register the Lord only knows — and I mean that literally. More than forty years later I received a letter from a niece in America lamenting the fact that she had written to the Rector of St. Peter's Montserrat, British West Indies, to verify the birthdate of Emily Dixon DUTTON, and his reply stated that he regretted that all records of that particular period had been destroyed in a hurricane. What a blessing it was that I had copied, and more particularly, had kept those transcripts.

Concerning the family of her late husband, Llewellyn Mudge Rains DUTTON, stories she told were equally romantic to a child's mind. His father, Lieut. Thomas DUTTON, had joined the Royal Navy as a midshipman at the age of thirteen, and had spent his boyhood and young manhood at sea before coming to Van Diemen's Land as Agent for the Cressy Company in 1828. Other tales were of his ancestors mentioned in Burke's *Peerage*. All these nurtured the feeling of family continuity that I had. A portrait of grandfather Llewellyn DUTTON's grandmother, Sarah Kingdom DUTTON hung on the living-room wall, and Sarah Kingdom, though dead, was a part of my life.

Some years later, a cousin showed me a letter which Sarah had written to her grandson Llewellyn whom she had never seen. Written in 1855, when she was 83 and Llewellyn was 17, it was full of love and wise counsel, which further strengthened the rapport which I had always had with her. In this letter she mentioned other relatives by name. The letter had been kept by Llewellyn as a young man and through the years of his marriage and after his death by his widow, and finally copied by me, his grand-daughter.

Just this year, during research into the family of Llewellyn's mother, Heloisa Frances Doran Rose Lette, the statement was made by a relative that Rollo LETTE had gone to the goldfields of California. Rollo LETTE and his wife were the relatives mentioned by Sarah Kingdom DUTTON in her letter as living in England in 1855. She said she was planting some seeds of Australian plants which they had given her, and that they had raised a wattle tree for her which she would get and transplant when the cold weather was over. So Rollo LETTE and his wife Elizabeth Mannering LETTE, if they had ever gone to California, were certainly in England in 1855, and in communication with the mother-in-law of Rollo's sister, Heloisa.

Heloisa, too, had made a written statement. This statement was in part, praise of her father, Peter LETTE, but it also gave details of her own life and how she was born at sea (30°17'S latitude and 95°14'22" E longitude) on the *Hotter* while on the voyage from India to Van Diemen's Land. (How romantic I thought that was!) She went on to state that her father and mother and two children and herself an infant arrived in Van Diemen's Land, the goods they brought with them having to be towed by barges up the Tamar River to Launceston. She next told of their life in

Launceston and the building of "Curramore" at White Hills on land that was a grant, and of much land that was bought subsequently. The chronicle ends with praise for her father and an account of his death. I made a copy of the statement.

This communication was doubly fortuitous. In the year 1938 a letter appeared in the *Examiner*. It had been sent to the Tourist Bureau in Launceston by Violet Lesley Gordon Sutherland GREGG in Ireland asking for information about her great-grandfather, Peter LETTE, who had settled at "Curramore", white Hills, near Launceston — my great-great grandfather. I wrote to her on behalf of my mother, sending a copy of Heloisa's letter and other details my mother and I could remember being told. In reply we received the basic details of the LETTE family tree back to the year 1600. How Lucky Can You Get!? Correspondence continued until after Violet herself came to Australia and visited us and other LETTE descendants.

The double fortune, in a genealogical sense, was made manifest last year. For the sake of accuracy I have been verifying names and dates in the Archives Office records of all known relatives who have lived here in Tasmania between the years 1803 and 1900; among these Peter LETTE's family. In the baptism register of St. John's parish, Launceston I found recorded, among others, the birth and baptism dates of Heloisa and her two younger brothers: Eloisa Frances Doran Rose (Heloisa); Peter Lemon (Peter Lemonde); and Roland (Rollo Mitchell); all baptized on 4 June 1822. The place of birth of all three was given as Launceston. But Heloisa had not only stated that she was born at sea, but had also given the express latitude and longitude, the name of the ship and her birthdate in February 1817. So which record was right?

Again, at the Archives Office I found shipping records which referred to the *Buster* arriving off Port Dalrymple 14 March 1817 and the arrival of Peter LETT and family as passengers 16 March 1817. Had I not Heloisa's statement, I would have taken it for granted that she had been born in Launceston.

Again, a younger son of Peter LETTE, John Maximus LETTE, born at "Curramore" 18 September 1827 and only five and a half years old when his father died, 3 April 1833, wrote in his old age that "his father and mother and six children born in India arrived in Tasmania" and that "three children had been born here." This information had been passed on to many members of the family, especially to those living in New South Wales. But Heloisa had said "two children and myself an infant". Some years ago, before microfilming was in use here, I had transcribed from Archive Office records many pages concerning Peter LETTE's family. One item was the census record of February 1828 which was a 'Return of the names of Children Having Both Parents Living' in the District of Morven, together with their ages. All of Peter LETTE's children except the youngest, Henry Elms LETTE, who was not born until 10 August 1829, are listed with their ages as of February 1828. They were: William, 13;

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Peter, 8; Caesar, 4; Rollo, 6; Mary, 15; George, 2; Harriet (Heloisa) 11; and John, 1.

Corroborative evidence of this is found on a page titled 'Confirmations in the Church of St. John, Llanceston, Co. Cornwall, by the Venerable Archdeacon Broughton, Sunday 21st April 1873': "William LITTLE, 18; Peter LITTLE, 14, Mary Ann Lette, 20; Louisa Lette, 16." With the recent acquisition of the records of the parish of St. John by the Archives Office we now have the birth and baptism dates of all of Peter LITTLE's children except the two eldest, William Horn and Mary Ann, who were born in India.

In 1975, after retirement, and myself a grandmother, I made a visit to the U.S.A. to see my two eldest sons who had been born in Idaho but who had lived in Tasmania until they went back to America to serve in the armed forces when they were 21. Now they were married and there were ten grandchildren whom I had not seen. So that they too could have a record of their family's history in Australia and the United Kingdom, I took with me as hand luggage a leather shopping bag containing my file, as it was then, of nearly a thousand 5"x3" cards of genealogical information, this being my most compact method of recording and transportation. (I would need more than a shopping bag now.)

While there I made a copy of these cards for each of the two families. As well, a labour of love, I made a similar filing-card record of their American forebears, one of whom was from a particular HARRIS family which had been carefully researched to the time the first member arrived in America.

Early in 1976, on my way home, I visited my niece in San Diego. She too was an active member of our family genealogical association\* — and that is another story — and she showed me a book which she had just bought. This was a record of the genealogy of many American families, carefully compiled by an accredited genealogist. My niece showed me the records of her husband's family and I was impressed by the careful and documented research.

Then, almost idly, I riffled through the pages and the name "HARRIS" caught my eye. (It couldn't be the same HARRIS family, of course; there must be hundreds of them.) But it was! and not only to the first member of the family on American soil, but to his progenitors in England and on the Continent as far back as there are written records and beyond, into the time of oral traditions!

# Tasmanian Placename Changes

Changes in place names can present difficulties for anyone trying to trace his or her family history. If you had Tasmanian ancestors who came from Rumney's Huts, Cabbage Tree Hill, Shepton Montacute or Snake Plains, would you know where to start looking for the records of your family? How often have you looked on a map only to find that these and many other towns and localities don't seem to exist any more. Hours of fruitless searching can be avoided if you are aware of these changes (or at least know where to look to find out about them).

Most people are aware of the change from Van Diemen's Land, the name associated with all the alleged brutalities of the convict system, to "the sweet one of Tasmania"<sup>1</sup>. However, how many people are aware of the many different names for the township and locality of Scottsdale? In 1840, after James Scott, the Government Surveyor, explored the north-east of Tasmania and selected land in the area, it became known as Scott's New Country<sup>2</sup>. Other early names for the area include Cox's Paradise, commemorating Thomas Cox, one of the first settlers in the area; and Tucker's Corner, named after Thomas Tucker who first settled in the area in 1859. The town was officially known as Ellesmere until 1893. In that year the name was changed to Scottsdale in honour of the first surveyor in the area. Other towns and localities have similar histories of name changes.

Tasmanian nomenclature owes much to the work of the early surveyors and explorers. Usually, armed with little but the sketchiest of maps, they opened up previously undiscovered or little known country. They usually named features and localities by drawing upon the names of prominent citizens from the United Kingdom or elsewhere. For example, the surveyors employed by the Van Diemen's Land Company commemorated prominent members of the Company in names such as Bischoff, River Inglis and the River Cam<sup>4</sup>. The first wave of settlers, often unaware of their work, gave their name to different localities, for example, the town of Baden (in the Oatlands municipality) was formerly known as Rumney's Huts, commemorating an early settler who erected a crude dwelling in the area<sup>5</sup>. Frequently the names of pioneers or the names of their properties became place names. Sometimes this meant that a given locality had more than one name or that the same name was used for more than one locality.

The development of a state wide postal system created a need for standardization. Localities were often given a special postal name or else generally accepted local names became standardized. In 1912 Point Rapid, West Bay and Blackwood Hills became known as Rowella as the Post Master General's Department felt the need for a common postal name for the area. However, the former names still persist as the names of local landmarks<sup>6</sup>. In other cases such as that of Beltana, a name change was made because there was a duplication of the name with

a town in South Australia. So, in 1903, Beltana became Lindisfarne.

The establishment of a Nomenclature Board was important in the collation, authorization and spelling of both old and new names. The Board is a satellite body of the Lands Department<sup>7</sup>. It is located on the sixth floor of the Lands Department Building, 134 Macquarie Street. The Board has a register of all officially recognized place names in Tasmania and this contains a considerable amount of information on the dates and background to place name changes. (The author of this paper is grateful for the assistance of Mr. M.W. Clennett of the Nomenclature Board in the preparation of this paper.)
